



MEETING PROGRAM

SPEAKER: Society member, Lynn Catlin, will present a program entitled "Wildflower Pollenation".

PLANT FAMILY: Discussion, presented by Charlu' Choate, will be on the *FUMARIACEA* (Fumewort or Earthsmoke) family. This plant family has watery stems and dissected leaves. The irregularly shaped flowers are in terminal clusters; have 2 small, scale-like sepals and 4 petals that are somewhat united---the outer 2 spurred at the base. The flowers are perfect and have 6 stamens (2 sets of 3) and 1 pistil. Only 3 members of one genus (*Corydalis*) are in Alaska.

MYSTERY PLANT--Hi, I'm your mystery plant for December. I am an erect, strongly-branched plant (12-18" high) with quadrangular stems. Other members of my family in Alaska have very weak stems and tend to be quite decumbent. Mv leaves, which are sessile (stemless) have 3 linear veins, are lanceolate to linear, and grow 4 in stem. My whorl around my a numerous small 4 petaled white flowers are clustered at the ends of my branches. I am a common plant in rocky sub-alpine open hillsides and fields. My common name is derived from the original use made of me by people; because of my non-crushing 4 sided stems. What am I?

LOTIONS, NOTIONS and POTIONS by Old Doc

This will be a rather short article as Doc is recovering from the 24-day flu...(yes, that's day, not hour. At least, it seems to have lasted that long).

Our subject this month is *Menyanthes trifoliata* ,the Buckbean, which is member of the Menyanthes family, but was formerly classified under the a Gentiana family. It is also called Marsh Trefoil. The plant grows in ponds, bogs, swamps and wet meadows though most of Alaska and Yukon, south to California, and east to the Atlantic; circumboreal. It may form dense platforms of vegetation over the surface of ponds. It arises from rhizomes. There are 3 leaflets on a petiole ranging from 2 to 10". The inflorescence consists of a spike of 5-petaled white to pinkish flowers with white hairs on the insides. (Pretty good, eh? Doc is becoming somewhat more botany oriented.) Buckbean's healing properties have been recognized since ancient times and it is still used in rural areas of Britain as an infusion for feverish colds. In early times it was a popular remedy for dropsy, catarrh, scables and "hot rotten agues" (a sort of malarial fever, sounds terrible, what?). The drug is provided by the leaves which contain organic acids. fats, and (would you believe it) a glycoside called menyanthine.


