PLANT FAMILY---Larry Read will lead a discussion on the *Cryptogrammaceae* or Mountain Parsley Family. There are 3 genera in Alaska. They are commonly known as the Parsley Ferns and grow mainly in rocky outcroppings throughout Southeastern and Southcentral Alaska and the Aleutian Chain, and in scattered areas of Interior Alaska. They are small plants with somewhat curly and lacy sterile leaves and fertile fronds.

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CONTEST RESULTS



MYSTERY PLANT

This small plant of coastal Southeastern and Southcentral Alaska and the Aleutian Chain has dark green leaves with 3 sharply-toothed leaflets on long petioles. Leaves are persistent, even in the winter. These plants grow in very moist, mossy woodlands. The long slender stem bears 1 flower with 5 very small rounded petals and 5 white sepals that are pinkish on the outer side. Its bright yellow roots are filiform (fine and thread like).



PROTECTED AREA

CHOCOLATE CHERRY BARS

1 package Pillsbury Plus devils food cake mix
21 ounce can cherry pie filling
1 teaspoon almond extract
2 eggs, beaten

FROSTING

1 cup sugar
5 teaspoons margarine
1 1/3 cup milk
1 cup (6 ounce package) semi-sweet chocolate bits

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 13x9 oblong pan (or 15x10 jelly roll pan). In a large bowl combine first four ingredients. Stir by hand until well mixed. Pour into prepared pan. Bake jelly roll pan 20-30 minutes; 13x9 pan 5 minutes longer or until toothpick comes out clean. In a small saucepan, combine sugar, margarine and milk. Boil, stirring constantly one minute. Remove from heat. Stir in chocolate pieces until smooth. Pour over warm bars. Makes 3 dozen.

(Try using German chocolate cake mix -- that's good, too.)

This is the cherry 'cake' I took to the recent potluck and some people asked for the recipe.
