### ANCHORACORACIDA MEDITING NIDWAS

The May meeting of the Anchorage Chanter will be held on Monday, May 6th, at 7:30PM in the meeting room of the Muldoon Library in the Carr's Shopping Mail on the corner of Muldoon Road and Northern Lts. The library will be closed, so enter by the door at the rear of the building.

**BOARD OF DIRECTORS:** The Board of Directors wll meet at 6:45PM just prior to the general membership meeting.

PROGRAM: Speaker, Doug Tryck, will discuss "Cultivated Cousins of our Wild Plants". Come and hear an interesting lecture on some familiar cultivated garden plants that are closely related to our wild plants. Doug is a horticulturist and owns Tryck's Nursery on Rabbit Creek Road. He experiments with different and unusual plants for the Anchorage area.

PLANT FAMILY: The Pulsatilla and Anemone genera of the Buttercup or Ranunculaceae family. Presenter will be Gary Davies. These 2 genera were once all classified as Anemones. Pulsatilla now is being classified separately because it has a longer, plumose (feathery) style and stamens with staminodia (gland-like sterile structures). Both genera, like the Thalictrum genus studied last month, have petaloid sepals only (no true sepals). The modified upper stem leaves form in a circle around the stem below the flowers. Flowers are usually large and showy and mostly singular.

The May meeting is usually our last until the Fall, and Dr. David Morray, curator of the herbariom at UAF, is usually our guest speaker. Dave was not able to make it in May this year; but, here's the good news:

He will be in Anchorage in early June hosting some Soviet botanists that will be visiting Alaska. So we will have a special meeting on Monday, June 3rd at 7:30PM, at the Muldoon Library, at which time Dr. Murray will speak on the Bottiny of Ellesmere Island in northern Northwest Territories, Canada.

# MYSTERY PLANT:

This grass is found along \ almost all of the roadways in the city of Anchorage, and provides a beautiful pinkish-red to the vegetative display towards the end of summer.

The erect stems, 12 to 16 inches tall, with two to three long, thin leaves, each bear a nodding, pale-green to purple spike that may be up to 4 inches long. This grass is easily recognized by these long awns which give a silky, almost fluid, appearance to the heads of the grass as they wave in unison in the breeze.
