
Board members please take note and mark your calendars. Continued absence from Board meetings can be grounds for removal from the Board.

PROGRAM: ANPS member, Scott Christy, of the Alaska Dept. of Natural Resources, will present a program on "The Relationship of Land Forms and Vegetation".

He will lecture and show slides on the topography of Alaska, and explain how the physical aspects, their composition, the direction and angle of terrain, and climate, control the type and kinds of plants that grow here.

PLANT FAMILY: The Parsley or Apiacea family will be completed by Forrest Baldwin. The discussion will include the following genera: Angelica, Ligusticum, Cnidium and Conioselinum. All of theseplants have pinnately-divided and toothed leaves and many are aromatic herbs. The tiny, 5-petalled, white or green flowers are held well above the leaves in double umbels.

MYSTERY PLANT: Sticking out of the Anchorage bogs is one of Alaska's most recognizable plants. The tree often contains a narrow, club-like crown. The short, sharp needles arise from peg-like bases on the pubescent twig, especially towards the branch tips. They have 4 white lines on the needles. The cones are 1.5 to 3.0cm long, egg-shaped, frequently near the trunk, and remain on the tree for many years. The bark is thin, scaly, and usually gray or blackish. These trees are frequently stunted, due to habitat in areas of permafrost. They are also frequently termed the Drunken Forest, as they become tilted from the frost-heaving of the soil.
