Mystery Plant

A tall perennial with a stiff and obvious seed head, the mystery plant may still be visible through the snow in some areas. The deeply toothed leaves are arranged alternately on the flowering stems and are very distinctive. The top surface of the leaf is dark green and the underside is, in contrast, covered with short silvery hairs. This aromatic plant has been used

medicinally in the past and salves and liniments are still prepared today. The small flower heads are inconspicuous, but numerous. There are four sub-species of this mystery plant which can be found in most parts of Alaska.

Plant Family

Sarah Andres will present another portion of the Lily family. She will discuss chives, *Allium schoenprasom*, and chocolate lily, *Fritillaria camschatensis*. Chocolate lily is a bulbous perennial that likes damp meadows and is common in coastal areas of SE, South Central Alaska and the Aleutian Chain. It can also be found inland as far north as Denali Park. The bell shaped flowers are usually a rich brown color splashed with green. The tasty bulb has been an important food item for native Alaskans. Wild chives is also a food item and is used as a seasoning much like the commercial variety. Its head of small delicate lavender flowers is on a stiff stem among the hollow flavorful long leaves. This month's selection is a direct contrast to last month's selections which were both poisonous.
